After years of planning and preparation, Houlton School has been given the all clear to open.

Following the submission of the school's recent Section 10 consultation, the Secretary of State for Education has formally signed the school's funding agreement, which is one of the final milestones before welcoming the first pupils in September.

With building works on the school progressing well and on programme, the campus will see the Grade II listed buildings transformed to become the heart of the school. The site will also boast purpose-built Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) and Humanities buildings, as well as a Sport England Compliant Sports Centre that will be available for community use. There will also be a professional grade radio studio that will broadcast from the site, honouring the campus' heritage as a global centre for communication.

Michael McCulley, Principal Designate at Houlton School,

said: "It has certainly been a busy few months for us here at Houlton, from building progress to staff recruitment and everything in between, it is fantastic to see our plans coming to fruition and to receive such overwhelming support from members of our community."

Her dog, Lola, a Pets as Therapy registered Cockapoo, also comes with years of experience as a School Wellbeing Dog.

Jennie Nurse, Principal at Henry Hinde Junior School, said: "I firmly believe that school should be a sanctuary for children – somewhere to build their self-esteem, their confidence and their resilience and to really nurture their wellbeing.

"That's why I've introduced my Cockapoo, Lola, as Henry Hinde Junior's new Wellbeing Dog. Lola has worked in schools for her whole life and is very used to children and the workings of the school day. She is friendly, sociable and well-trained, and loves being around children and the school environment.

"From my experience, and the research I have carried out, I believe there will be so many benefits for the whole school community. From developing a sense of responsibility, to helping to reduce stress and anxiety, I've seen first-hand the impact that a dog like Lola can have on behaviour and the self-esteem of children too."

A former English and maths lead, Miss Nurse also brings with her a passion for the arts, drama and music, which will become the hub of school life. With new activities and events set to take place throughout the year, the school will also continue to build upon its close partnership with Henry Hinde Infant School.

Miss Nurse added: "Feedback from children and their families has been brilliant so far, and it has been a pleasure getting to know them. The staff here are so fantastic too, they are really committed and keen to make a difference for our pupils.

"I've also been getting to know the team at Henry Hinde Infant School as well, and I look forward to further collaboration across our schools over the coming months." Our commitment to wellbeing and happiness

A strong commitment to the wellbeing and happiness of our pupils, staff and our wider community has always been an integral part of what we stand for.

As the impacts of the pandemic have shown us, it is now even more important to care for ourselves and each other.

Over the last few months we have been building on our wellbeing provision and introducing new activities and initiatives to promote the positive mental health and wellbeing of our pupils, as well as developing their self-confidence and resilience.

For example, at Ashlawn School new daily themes have been adopted including Motivation Monday, Wellbeing Wednesday and Thank you Thursday, which have become a key feature of the weekly calendar.

At Henry Hinde Junior School, during the lockdown each child received a 'Keep fit at home pack', including a ball, skipping rope and frisbee to play with, while pupils at Henry Hinde Infant School were delighted to receive their very own ball as part of a weekly fitness and skills challenge.

Across each school, 'exercise across the world' competitions were also introduced, encouraging pupils to get outside, enjoy the fresh air and count their steps or complete other types of exercise in order to contribute to school-wide journeys across the world.


